
Rockin' in Williamsport

On October 11, my daughter, Amber and I, joined three members from the Maryland club on a field trip to Pinesburg Quarry, a hard rock quarry, in Williamsport, MD. This was our first visit to a quarry!

After spending the Friday before looking for chisels, hammers, and safety wear, we packed up and headed for Williamsport early the next morning. We arrived about 7:15 a.m. and headed to the quarry about 8:00 a.m. after meeting with the quarry manager for a safety talk. It was a beautiful, cool, day and we enjoyed searching the walls of the quarry as well as the many piles rocks lying around everywhere. Since weatherwise, the week had been pretty dry, we were able to drive our cars around the quarry, which proved to be a big help when it came to stashing our finds.





Michael, one of the Maryland club members set off to search for fossils. He found a few snail shells embedded in mud/clay. Most were too fragile to be removed. Tina and Harry (also from the Maryland Club), and Amber and I, found calcite, calcite, and more calcite. According to my mineral book, calcite has the hardness of about a "3". Tina also found a bit of "fools gold". The quarry manager said that, in the past, they have also found geodes, fluorite, smoky quartz, dolomite, and baryte. Unfortunately, we didn't find any. We did find stone sculptures, reminiscent of those seen in the woods of Accokeek, MD, left by Harry.

By 11:00 a.m. we were worn out from trudging around in heavy, steel-toed boots, so we headed home. We had a great first visit to the quarry and look forward to visiting the Rockville Quarry.

Kentucky Fluorite

For the last few years, the Boston Mineral Club has been holding field trips to a now-abandoned fluorite mine in Marion, Kentucky. This year, the trip was held the Columbus Day weekend, and they were nice enough to invite other clubs to join them, including the Northern Virginia Mineral Club. As it turned out, my daughter, Brooke, and I were the only ones to take them up on this offer. Oh how glad we were that we did!

Kentucky - hey, it's a state contiguous with Virginia, so this place can't be that far away, right? Well, Marion Kentucky is clear over in the western panhandle of the state, just south of Illinois! Actually, this whole region shared by Kentucky, Illinois, and Indiana is famous for its fluorite. There have been some very sizable fluorite mines in the area in the past, and some spectacular museum pieces have been found. In fact, the museum that permits this field trip and provides access to the abandoned mine is the Ben Clement Mineral



museum. This museum could almost more accurately be called a fluorite museum because fluorite is the showcase mineral.

Anyway, getting to Marion, KY from northern Virginia is a lengthy 13-14 hour drive. We left on Friday to start the dig on Saturday morning. And dig we did!

We started by looking at some of the old dump piles that had produced some decent 1-cm crystals in the past with color being that of grape candy. It's that purple! But

after finding some pieces that were marginally interesting, we heard some excitement back where a pit was being dug.

Part of the field trip fees for this expedition included \$20 to cover the cost of excavation in an area that the Boston Mineral Club had previous felt produced some decent specimens. Unfortunately, the machine broke down before completing the task, so several of the guys were down there in the mud digging out a pit. At about 2pm, they hit the fluorite vein, and some nice large crystals could be seen. Again, very purple, like grape flavored candy.

I decided to concentrate my efforts on helping with the dig. We setup a bucket brigade to get the mud out of the pit as the pit was right next to a creek bed that was leaking water back into the pit - and bringing mud right back down with it. It was back breaking work, but every minute of it was fun...call me strange. All day long we worked at this. We would get to some fluorite and bring out some very muddy



pieces. Those less willing to work in a back breaking mud pit took the high and dry ground but spent their time cleaning the mud off the specimens we broke free in the pit.

This happened all day, as it did on day 2. At the end of day 2, since there were several people not staying longer, there was a lottery held to distribute the samples. We all pulled numbers and got to make our selection when our number was called. At the end of day 2, Brooke and I had

several wonderful specimens of fluorite, many with significant chunks of galena in matrix (a nice, gleamy sparkly ga-

lena - one of my favorite minerals).

The evening of day 2 was a night dig of fluorescent minerals at a nearby mineral dump, freshly turned over for our arrival. This site was less interesting than others, but we found some neat things. Brooke found one specimen that looked like a fossilized leaf. With the surrounding calcite



glowing one color and the "leaf" region glowing far less, this was a specimen that looked really neat in SWUV.

This was a very enjoyable trip for Brooke and I, as we enjoyed so much of what Marion, KY had to offer. The mineral museum is a real "gem" (pun intended) in the rough here, and the fried catfish supper (a local specialty) was not to be missed! Now, we have more fluorite than we know what to do with, and so much of it is so beautiful!

Tool of the Month

The tool for this month is one that is particularly useful for cleaning the MUD off of specimens. If you have been to a talc mine or any quarry or mine with lots of bentonite or other clay-like mud, then you probably have had too much fun cleaning that mud out of all the little nooks and crannies of your crystalline specimen.

That's where an Ultrasonic cleaner comes in very handy! These devices clean specimens very gently yet at the same time very thoroughly. If a brush can

clean your part, so can an ultrasonic, in general. However, an ultrasonic cleaner can reach in the *tiniest little* nooks and crannies!

These cleaners are generally quite expensive, so they



are not for the faint-hearted. Used models can run a couple hundred dollars for a decent-sized container (i.e.1 gallon size). However, they are a unique type of tool that can accomplish in 10 minutes what might otherwise take hours.

For many rockhounds, perhaps this tool would only come in handy once or twice a year. For this reason, it may be helpful to simply borrow one from a fellow rockhound that already has one.

Yours truly has a 6-liter sized cleaner that performed quite nicely at cleaning out the mud from a couple of buckets filled with mud-laden fluorite. I am willing to loan it to club members. Contact me at my email or phone number (on the back cover of the newsletter) for more information. It's easy to use....
